### Government Finance and Insurance Programs

As you plan for a blood or marrow transplant (BMT), you may wonder how you will afford the care you need. There are U.S. government programs that may help you.

#### **Disability programs**

The Social Security Administration (SSA) runs two main types of disability programs. You may not think of yourself as disabled, but you may qualify for one of both of these programs if you can't work because of a medical condition.

- Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) SSDI provides monthly payments based on your work history and Social Security taxes you've paid. If you qualify for this, you will also be eligible for SSI.
- 2. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) SSI provides monthly payments based on financial need. SSI benefits are not based on your work history or taxes you have paid.

Full eligibility requirements can be found online at <u>ssa.gov/disability</u>. Your BMT social worker can also help you find out if you are eligible.

#### Appeal a denial

It's common that disability applications are denied the first time. You may want to appeal your denial. SSDI benefits can be back-paid for up to a year from the date of the official disability, so it may be a good option for you.

#### Legal help

You might consider hiring a lawyer to help you file an appeal. If you're concerned about paying for a lawyer, keep in mind:

- The SSA limits the amount that a lawyer can charge you (unless your appeal goes to the Federal District Court).
- You will only pay the fee if you win the appeal and qualify for benefits.

#### COBRA

COBRA is a law that allows people in most employer-sponsored health insurance plans to continue their health insurance coverage after they leave their job. However, you have to pay for it yourself, which can be very expensive.

It may be a good option for you, but before you apply for COBRA, explore the health insurance plans offered through <u>HealthCare.gov</u>. They may cost less or have better coverage.

#### Screening Tools

Free, confidential, screening tools may help you find benefit programs you may be eligible for. They can also tell you how to apply and which programs might be best for you.

These programs do not determine if you will receive benefits and they do not enroll you in any programs. You still must apply.
